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

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Why does this collaboration exist?

The goal of this collaboration is to provide information and access to promising new research studies designed to better understand, prevent and treat Alzheimer's disease for our patients on the South Shore.

Alzheimer's disease strips away our most human qualities — memory, personality, reasoning and language — eventually preventing the ability of people to perform the simplest everyday activities. In the United States alone, more than five million people suffer from Alzheimer's disease — and this number is projected to grow to seven million by 2025.



Why is this research important?

Research participation is critical to finding a cure. We are working with our colleagues on the Boston campus to provide access to transportation and information that will support our patients and families interested in research participation. We are in need of healthy volunteers, people concerned about their memory and thinking, and people diagnosed with mild cognitive impairment (MCI) and early Alzheimer's disease dementia (AD) to participate in research.
